Captain's Report for the AGM

Thursday 9th March 2023

Some people have said that 2022 season was the most successful in the club's long and distinguished history.¹

After three early defeats – coming at the hands of long-time rivals KSOB, and strong Hunwick and Collingwood sides – DCSCC put together a winning run that included victories against Mallards, Hild and Bede, Sunderland NAS, King James, Farmers, Josephine Butler, Grey SCR, E=MCC and Knights. This 'run' also included three defeats, one of which frustratingly, came (again) at the hands of KSOB. We finished the season with a record of played 21, won 11, lost 10. The Spirit of Cricket award went to club Secretary Aidan 'Duffman' Duffy for his tireless work on behalf of the club. We are all grateful to him and wish him the very best as he moves on this year. There's always a game for you here, Aidan, if you find yourself back in Durham.

The real winner over the past year however, was cricket itself. The team spirit, camaraderie and cheer with which the members of DCSCC conducted themselves over the course of the season was truly heartwarming, and was the foundation of some of our more memorable victories, including those against both Hild and Bede and Jospehine Butler. With the exception of the fiasco that was Rootball, minor altercations at both Wearmouth and Hunwick, the Captain throwing his bat at the Farmers' midwicket fieldsman during a downpour on MC2, and an unfortunate encounter with traffic police on the outskirts of Sheffield, the members of the club conducted themselves admirably throughout the season.

The sense of optimism that carried the club through the season was continued through into winter nets; beginning before the end of the season in September, a twice-weekly session at Maiden Castle has seen attendances regularly well into double-figures, much to the embarrassment of Duram City Cricket club in the neighbouring net on a Thursday evening. The more people we bring in, of all genders, creeds and classes, and the more new fixtures we open up, the healthier the club in the long run.

With this in mind, I would like to express my thanks to Jill Cartledge. Jill has informally taken over as Club Secretary. She will – I anticipate - be officially given the role this evening. Jill has already put in a great deal of effort in arranging matches for the coming year. We should all be grateful to her for her hard work without which all of our hours of practice would be wasted. So thanks, Jill, and welcome to the post. Thanks are also to be expressed to those who have continued to fulfil their roles over the past year. This includes Nigel Metcalfe for keeping the website (without which I would not have been abel to write this report), Eckart Wrede for keeping and managing the kit, and Tony Cleaver for making people go to the pub on a



Thursday. Thanks also to Rory for his unofficial but important work as Safeguarding Officer.

This list should also include our Vice-Captains who, over the past year have been Mujeeb, Rich Root and Stephen Boothroyd. As I will be 'working' in the United States for the first half of the season, it falls on their shoulders – or whoever takes on the role of Vice-Captain this year – to skipper the team to success until the away season begins in July.
